FRIENDS of Indiana Dunes Updates

The FRIENDS of Indiana Dunes would like to thank all who helped with our dedicated appeal for the State Park's ADA compliant Beach Mats. Most of the beach mats have been installed and are in use by visitors. We are receiving frequent appreciative attention from the public for our beach mat support, including from some of the mobility-impaired users who can now enjoy being on the beach in our State Park. Donations are still being accepted for the project at <u>dunefriends.org/state-park-beach-mat-project</u> as additional funding will be needed to help with upkeep and repair of the anchoring clamps for the beach mats.

The importance of creating maintenance funding became abundantly clear to the FRIENDS this summer when we discovered that three of the FRIENDS' purchased accessible ATVs at the State Park were out of commission. The Board quickly approved the needed funds to get them repaired as well as purchased back-up batteries to have on hand.



The FRIENDS have developed a Hardship Help Fund to help households within Indiana's Lake, Porter or LaPorte counties purchase an Indiana Dunes National Park Annual Pass at a reduced cost. Cards with FRIENDS contact information will be distributed at the discretion of National Park staff to an individual or Family that expresses the entrance fee is a hardship for them. We ask the participants to donate up to \$20 to help sustain the fund and in turn they receive a one-year complimentary FRIENDS membership.

The FRIENDS are pleased to announce that in partnership with the National Park we have created a Chellberg Farm Produce Stand in the parking lot adjacent to our Office. Extra vegetables from the farm garden and DLC's secret garden are placed in the stand and visitors are asked to leave a donation to the FRIENDS for the items they take. In addition to the goodies from the gardens, Maple Syrup produced from Chellberg Farm sap is available. All donations are being used to support Chellberg Farm. This fall the FRIENDS will be purchasing two beef calves to be housed at the farm. The plan is to primarily grass feed them, supplementing them with vitamins and minerals as needed, and in 18-24 months, FRIENDS members and/or National Park volunteers will be able to obtain the processed prime ground beef for a donation to the FRIENDS. The goal is to have farm animals at Chellberg Farm and raise them in an ecological manner. The hope is for this program to become self-sustaining.

FRIENDS Celebrate 40 Years

Forty years ago, in the summer of 1982, a small group of National Lakeshore volunteers met and decided to create a group that could provide financial as well as volunteer support. They called themselves Friends of Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore. Four short years later, this group changed their name to Friends of Indiana Dunes, incorporated, applied for not-for-profit status, and included the Indiana Dunes State Park as another recipient of their efforts. In those early years, the budget was tight and total funding to both parks was about \$5,000. However, this little group grew by diligently working to increase their membership (at one time there was slightly over 700 members) and their fundraising efforts, seeking corporate funding, memorial donations, and let's not forget, 26 years ago, the First Annual Native Plant Sale was held on a snowy day in early April. In 1998, the FRIENDS extended their support to include the newly opened Dunes Learning Center, an environmental overnight camp for school children.

However, as with all groups there were good and bad years. Membership, donations and fundraising went up and then down, but we survived. Membership has started to regrow and our total annual support for our three partners is \$75,000. Our fundraising is exciting and diverse. Still hosting the Native Plant Sale but it will occur the first Saturday in June starting next year. Social media is now the norm and we have developed several Facebook series to generate interest in the FRIENDS, our partners, and our Indiana Dunes.

The Board is hoping you will join us for a celebration on October 1. Your invitation is enclosed. Spend time with old friends and make a few new ones. Distinctive hikes and programs will be offered prior to lunch for our very special members. After lunch, we will have a short business meeting followed by a ribbon cutting for the FRIENDS' sign at our Office. We look forward to the next forty years!!

Chickens on Chellberg Farm

It's summer and the chickens are loving it. In winter, they leave the coop in stately deliberation – in spring it's a happy wing flapping rush. The Chellbergs (Kjellbergs) had chickens. Anders Kjellberg, his wife Johanna and son Carl arrived in Duneland from Sweden in 1863. By 1869 they took title to the land where we now see Chellberg Farm in the Indiana Dunes National Park. They cleared the land and built the farm. They had cows, pigs, an orchard, a vegetable garden, five working horses and, in 1879, thirty chickens. The coop still stands, close to the back door of the house, where the chickens lived under the watchful eye of their farm family. The coop is unusually strong and spacious, testimony to their importance on the farm. Chickens provided both food and income for farm families. "Egg money" was earned by farmers' wives and was an important contribution to the family economy.



Today families love to bring their children to see the chickens and the chickens enliven and warm the visitor experience. Our chickens are Rhode Island Reds and Barred Rocks - the same breeds the Chellbergs kept. They are both dependable layers and meaty for good eating. They produce brown eggs - small ones when they are young and larger as they grow older. They easily live five years, and some go on to their eighth year. Our chickens are calm and at ease with strangers. At this point they are not really used to being handled but they run to greet us ...or to get treats!!!

In 2016, a plan was put into place where the national park would work with the Dunes Learning Center and the FRIENDS to bring some animals to the farm. The plan has the national park providing the space for the chickens in the historic coop. The current cows are contributed by area farmers, who house them at the farm and care for them with help from volunteers. The chickens are owned by Dunes Learning Center, which is responsible for their care. The Park appoints a ranger to be their liaison with the farm - for the animals, the garden and events at the farm. The Park assures that the facilities are kept in accordance with historical standards. The FRIENDS help pay for supplies for the chickens and in the recruitment of the volunteers who care for them.

The program depends on volunteers for its ongoing success. Volunteers drive up to the coop, year-round, in all kinds of weather, check on the chickens, count them, water and feed them and keep them safe. One can feel very pioneer while tramping through snow in the dusk of a cold evening, flashing your headlamp over "the girls" in the coop, satisfied that they are all there, snug on their roosts. It's quiet on the farm and the chicken care volunteers can savor the seasons as they do their rounds. One can do worse than being a person who cares for these wonderful chickens.
